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



IT'S SHOW TIME

Many hands make light work!

PLEASE NOTE: A Novice Section is included in the Winter Show. This will be open to Caboolture Members **ONLY**.

There will be 1 section <u>ONLY</u> covering all genera and there will be 1st ,2nd & 3rd prizes only.

If any novice grower is benching their orchids, please inform Geoff or Vic that you are a <u>novice</u> <u>grower</u> when you bring your orchids in for benching.

ESTIMATED TIMELINE FOR OUR SHOW:

Set up on Thursday 29th July.

Hall is opened at 8.30am for Caboolture members to set up the hall.

Tables etc are erected – assistance required.

Members plants for benching are required from 10.30-1.30pm

Assistance will be provided to place labels on your plants.

Deadline for benched plants to be placed for judging is 5pm. Sales Plants can be brought into the hall.

Any member who wishes to sell plants must have a barcode attached to their plants.

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: Show Marshalls are the only persons who are permitted to arrange or rearrange plants on the tables.

PLANT SALES: Sales plants must be <u>WELL ESTABLISHED</u> in the pot, <u>disease and pest &</u> ant free, something that you would buy yourself.

They will be inspected and any plant not passing inspection will <u>not</u> be placed on the sales table.

As we are an orchid society, orchids are the predominate sales plants.

Flowering Anthuriums, Bromeliads, Tillandsias are <u>acceptable</u>, along with Ferns and non-flowering foliage plants.

Cacti & Succulents can be included in the plant sales. A max. limit of 30 plants total applies because of space restraints.

PLEASE NO water in broms, as this creates a safety issue.

Unacceptable plants will be removed at the discretion of the Sales Organiser.

This is a chance to sell excess orchids, bromeliads & tillandsias.

Flowering orchids are placed on the sales table <u>first</u> as these are what attract the public to our display.

It is also a huge help to our treasurer George if you give a priced list of your sales plants.

Other Societies will start to arrive after 2 pm

A meal will be provided at 6 pm for Judges, hot dishes have been planned for the dinner.

Judging commences at 7 pm

Show opens Friday, 30th:

Hall opens to the public at 8.30 am and closes at 4 pm. Entry to the show is \$4.00 for adults & children under 16 are free.

Throughout the day the assistance of members is required.

Saturday 1st July:

Hall opens to the public at 8.30 am and closes at 3pm.

Presentation of prizes at approx. 3.00pm

It is "normal" to allow the guest Societies to pack up their plants first.

<u>Assistance required</u> to clear orchids from the tables, pack up tables, chairs and clean the hall.

Membership Fees: \$20.00 per membership & \$10 per Junior under 16 Jill would like to share 2 of her slice recipes that members keep asking her for. Here they are!

CARAMEL WALNUT SLICE

Base:

1 cup S.R.Flour 1 cup Coconut ½ cup Castor Sugar 125grms butter, melted Topping:

2 eggs, lightly beaten
1 teasp. vanilla essence
1 cup Coconut
³/₄ cup Brown sugar
¹/₂ cup chopped Walnuts/Pecans

Method:

Base:

Combine flour, coconut and sugar in a bowl, stir in melted butter. Press mixture into a prepared 19cm x 29cm lamington tray. Bake in moderate oven (180deg or 160deg) fan forced for 15 minutes. Spread with the topping. Bake a further 20 minutes. Cool in pan before cutting.

Topping:

Combine eggs and essence in a bowl, stir in coconut, sugar and nuts. Mix well. Keeps about 4 days.

SOUR CREAM FRUIT SALAD SLICE

Base:

Topping:

1 Pkt Greens Orange Cake Mix 125grms butter, melted 1 cup Coconut 1 small tin of Fruit Salad (drained) 1 x 300ml ctn Sour cream

Method:

<u>Base</u>: Mix all together. Press into a 20cm x 10cm lamington tray and bake in a 170deg. Oven for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and let stand for 10 minutes. <u>Topping</u>:

Mix drained fruit and sour cream together. Pour onto base. Bake for 17 minutes, remove from oven and sprinkle with a mixture of cinnamon and sugar, and return to oven for a further 8 minutes. Cool in tin.

Sometimes I use toasted coconut instead of cinnamon/sugar.

ANY FLAVOUR OF CAKE MIX AND ANY TYPE OF FRUIT CAN BE USED.

AUSTRALIAN NATIVE ORCHIDS The Orchid Species Society

Environment

Native epiphytic or lithophytic orchids are found growing naturally in most of the moist humid areas on the east coast of Australia so it is relatively easy to provide suitable conditions for growing these species. Of the two most popular genera, dendrobiums prefer bright filtered light, 50%-70% shade cloth being ideal otherwise a tree or similar screen allowing dappled sunlight will suffice. Sarcochilus are usually found in more heavily shaded areas, so up to 90% shade and somewhat cooler and more humid conditions than for dendrobiums is generally preferred.

Temperature

SE Qld temperatures are usually fine for native orchids. Good air movement is important for most kinds, especially during the hottest or coldest periods. Natural airflow should not be impeded. Sarcochilus tolerate temperatures up to 30° C. Providing more shade and air movement whilst maintaining humidity by damping down the growing area when the temperature exceeds this will allow them to maintain health through the worst of summer. Protect against extreme cold during winter by giving them some overhead protection.

Watering & Fertilising

Perfect drainage is important as many Australian Native Orchids grow on trees or rocks and dry off quickly after rain. Water thoroughly then allow plants to dry out completely before rewatering. Water regularly in summer during active growth and sparingly in winter when the plants are at rest. If you receive regular winter rain, a solid roof over plants may be necessary to prevent over-watering in the cold conditions. Fertilise regularly, especially during the growing season, using a fertiliser for flowering plants, i.e. low in nitrogen and high in potassium.

Compost

The growing media should be free draining whilst slightly retentive of moisture. A coarse bark mix is ideal, add perhaps 20% gravel, perlite or similar if you wish. The heavier media lends some weight and stability when growing in pots. As a guide, use 10 mm bark in 100 mm pots, 15 mm bark in 150 mm pots and 20 mm bark in 200 mm pots or bigger. If established in the garden, a gravel bed under the plant will help with drainage or attach firmly to a tree or rock and tie a pad of coconut fibre or similar over the root mass.

Repotting

Dendrobiums are best done soon after flowering, at the beginning of the growing season. Leave Sarcochilus till March/April after the worst of the hot weather has passed. Sarcs grow all year but experience most growth during Autumn/ winter. Ensure pots have adequate drainage and are just big enough to contain the root system of the plant to be potted.

Pests and Diseases

Scale, aphid or spider mite can sometimes attack hardy and resilient Australian Native Dendrobiums and Sarcochilus. Treat with a recommended insecticide such as Diazinon or Pest Oil. Fungal infections are rare provided good air movement is maintained during wet weather.
