

A selection of black plastic pots are for sale at each cultural meeting. Various sizes are available. A range of other accessories are also available for sale.










Session 2 Making the most of orchids in the landscape Presenter Paul Russell (landscape designer)

Posed the question- Why don't we use them more in landscape design?

- Lack of knowledge and misinformation,
- Availability of suitable varieties
- Availability of suitable host trees for landscaping. recommends frangipanis, weeping willows,
- Poincianas
- Time needed to build the landscape.
- Challenges in blending foliage types and growth.

7 golden rules of landscape design

- 1 unity
- 2 balance
- 3 simplicity
- 4 focal point
- 5 Rhythm and lines
- 6 Composition and contrast
- 7 Proportion and scale

Recommendation- companion plant with 1 tillandsias

2 Bamboo orchids water well (Arundina graminifolia (**Bamboo Orchid**) - A tall terrestrial orchid with reedy stems, which can grow into large clumps. An easy to grow orchid in gardens.





3 Neobenthamia gracilis from South Africa usually grows on rocks. It blooms in a densely flowered spherical head on a terminal, branched or raceme, up to about 12.5 cm long inflorescence with fragrant flowers held occurring from the winter till the spring.

He grows it in terracotta pots. Don't need much water.

He uses jute straps to mount plants.- more natural

Pests- worst offenders- den beetles- control with jumping ants.

Planning a landscape- plant big to small

- Plant in masses and use repetition
- Companion plant
- Remember that roots are critical

Trends and new directions

Paphs are a primitive group in the orchid family. More than 80 species in this group, mostly from Asia.

- Recognise the growing environment and climate that you have.
- The genetic range of the genus is huge.
- Stick to primary Hybrids- They are easier to grow and flower.

Sub genus Brachypetalum group and intersections (slipper orchids)

are the most primitive, most ornamental and most threatened group in the Orchid family.

- Limited natural distribution area in south west China due to its special pollination mechanism and fungus-induced germination.

 Grow in shallow soil or humas often in limestone rocky crevices or at limestone.
 - Grow in shallow soil or humus, often in limestone rocky crevices or at base of trees. They need an open type mix that drains well/quickly. They typically have fat fleshy roots so they don't need to be watered as frequently as some of the other paphs. Prefer warm to hot days and cool nights. Cool dry winters.
- Good air circulation and bright filtered light
- Very dilute fertilising and flush after every few fertilising sessions.- Sensitive to salt build up so be careful not to burn the roots.
- Don't use neem oil as they can't handle it.

Hints: 1 Repot frequently- big flowers, small plant or use lots of inorganic material in mix to decrease frequency of repotting needed.

- 2 Research parentage to see if they are easy to grow
- 3 Look for plants that look clean and seem vigorous.

Sub-genus Parvisapalum group

- Generally robust
- large flowers relative to size of the plant
- Fanaticum- good genus

Combined Parvi- Brachy group

Images of the hybrid breeding between these 2 groups were shown along with commentary.

Multilfloral paphs include those from the section Cochlopetalum that flower sequentially from the same inflorescence stem producing flowers in succession (glaucophyllum, liemianum, moquetteanum, primulinum, victoria-mariae and victoria-regina.

Generally these are warm growing and bloom from spring through summer.

P. gigantefolum hybrids have a high flower count

P. Chiu Hua Dancer-good, only takes 4 years from flask to flower
